EQ: How did written languages help ancient civilizations? What type of written language did your ancient civilization (Rome/China/Greece or Egypt) use?

Hello archeologists! Welcome to our fourth lesson of Remote Learning! Today we're going to learn about the ways written languages helped ancient civilizations! We're going to start by taking a close look at Ancient Egyptian writing called hieroglyphs.

- 1. What do you think warmup? Is writing more like blowing a bubble, riding a bike, or going for a walk? Talk to a homework helper and explain your answer.
- 2. What do you SEE? What do you NOTICE? What do you WONDER about <u>this picture</u>? Talk to your homework helper about what you see, notice, and wonder. Archaeologists had to make assumptions and guesses about ancient Egyptian life until the discovery of the Rosetta Stone. Learn about the <u>Rosetta Stone here</u>. I don't know about you, but now I want to learn a new language!
- 3. If you want to learn more about the Rosetta Stone, <u>THIS</u> is a great place to start! It's a wonderful Wonderopolis article! You can even write some of your own hieroglyphs here.

- 4. Today, we have a mystery lesson we need your help with! First, read the mystery lesson mess and then look at the clues. You can cut the clues apart if that helps. Don't cut the hieroglyphs apart! Can you figure out which hieroglyphs match certain letters to solve the mystery? Some clues are rather tricky and will require the process of elimination. Good luck! Your TAG teacher will post the solution to the mystery on your TAG TEAMS page!
- 5. After you've solved the mystery. Please visit the <u>TAG website</u> and look for the link about WRITING that is listed for the ancient civilization you chose to learn more about last week.
- 6. Explore the link and complete the "I'm the Scribe!" worksheet. When you are done, share a picture of the worksheet with your TAG teacher in Seesaw or in Microsoft Teams. Of course, we love it when you record yourself reading your work in Seesaw.

The mystery lesson, clues, and "I'm the Scribe!" worksheets are all below. Keep scrolling.




Mystery Lesson Mess

Writing Mystery Lesson Clues

- The picture that is doubled represents the letter's name that is also "double."
- Vowels are represented by an arm, feathers, a rope, and a bird.
- The symbols for A, B, and D are all body parts.
- The symbol for the letter N looks like someone was drawing something over and over without lifting his pencil.
- The symbols for C looks like the shape that begins with a C.
- The name of the symbol for L begins with an L.
- The symbol for S is shaped like a candy cane.
- The symbol for I and E is the same.
- The symbols for T and K look like half of the symbol for C.
- The symbol for Y is a combination of pictures.
- The symbol for R looks like something on your face.
- F and V share the same symbol, and the symbol is an animal.
- The symbol for H looks like something you could get lost in.
- The symbol for G looks like something you would need if you went camping.
